




Turning the Tide for Birth and Breastfeeding

Dr Nils Bergman

Dr Bergman's primary professional interest revolves around Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC), and the underlying perinatal and developmental neuroscience. His diverse background explains his broader public health approach to supporting and promoting the global dissemination of maternal-infant skin-to-skin contact. He qualified in Cape Town, South Africa and later worked as a doctor at Manama Mission, Zimbabwe. Here he, with Midwife Agneta Jurisoo, developed and implemented Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) for premature infants right from birth, with dramatic improvement in survival of premature babies. He continues researching this and has given keynote addresses on KMC at International conferences in six continents. He has a Diploma in Child Health, a Masters degree in Public Health, and a Doctoral degree in Clinical Pharmacology.

Dr William Sears

William Sears, one of America's most renowned pediatricians, is the father of eight children, author of over 40 books on childcare and Associate Clinical Professor of Pediatrics at the University of California, Irvine School of Medicine. A pediatrician for over 35 years, he currently lives and practices pediatrics along with his three sons in San Clemente, California. Dr. Sears received his pediatric training at Harvard Medical School's Children's Hospital in Boston and The Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto, the largest children's hospital in the world, where he served as Associate Ward Chief of the newborn nursery and Associate Professor of Pediatrics. In addition to writing many books and scientific articles, Dr. Sears is a medical and parenting consultant to Baby Talk and Parenting Magazines. Dr. Sears is a fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and a fellow of the Royal College of Pediatricians.

Jill Bergman

Jill Bergman loves children!

She holds a degree in Geography and English and a Higher Diploma in Education. She has worked as a teacher, missionary, counsellor, guider and youth leader, in three cultures and using three languages. Nevertheless, her top priority is her family, and three children. All along she has been working with Dr Nils Bergman on Kangaroo Mother Care and has written a book – "Hold Your Prem" a workbook for skin-to-skin contact for parents of premature babies, as well as scripted and produced four films on KMC.

Gloria Lemay

Gloria Lemay attendant in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada. She specialises in VBAC and waterbirth. She has served birthing women since 1976 and is an advisory board member of Intact America. Her articles have been published in Midwifery Today Magazine. She is on the staff of Ancient Art Midwifery Institute and is a contributing editor of Midwifery Today. Vicki Chan

Vicki has been a midwife since 1983. She has worked in a large tertiary hospital and a small private birth centre. Presently she works part-time at Sunshine Coast Private Hospital in Queensland. She also travels abroad offering support and education to midwives, medical workers and women in developing countries. She has been involved in the support and education of student and registered midwives, and has spoken far and wide on matters of birth. Vicki has helped to establish Women's Health Clinic and Birth Centre in Fremo, in Africa and is passionate about women, the family, and the health of the community.

Dr Alison Stuebe

Alison is a maternal-foetal medicine subspecialist at the School of Medicine, University of North Carolina (UNC). She has published multiple peer-reviewed articles on the association between lactation and long-term maternal health outcomes. In the clinical arena, she serves as medical director of lactation at UNC Hospitals, where she works with an interdisciplinary team of faculty and staff in lactation, paediatrics, family medicine, ob/gyn, pathology, general surgery, dermatology, and maternal/child health. She is currently conducting research on clinical management of breastfeeding complications and the intersection between postpartum depression and premature weaning.

Bridget Ingle

Bridget Ingle is an International Board Certified Lactation Consultant in her 20th year of practice. Her professional background started in paediatric and midwifery nursing but easily moved to all things lactation and breastfeeding following the birth of their first child 25 years ago. Bridget initially supported breastfeeding mothers as a Counsellor with the Australian Breastfeeding Association (then NMAA) and after her certification as an IBCLC, she built a busy private practice in Brisbane, and gained considerable clinical experience in complex breastfeeding issues such as recurrent mastitis, abnormalities of latch, low supply, and cleft palate. Bridget enjoys sharing her knowledge as a speaker at conferences, mentoring new or aspiring IBCLCS, and as a tutor and educator with Health e-Learning.

Rachel Reed

Rachel Reed is a homebirth midwife and a lecturer at the University of the Sunshine Coast where she teaches in the Masters of Midwifery. She has practised midwifery in a range of models and settings in the United Kingdom and Australia. Rachel is committed to the promotion of physiological birth, and of women's innate ability to birth and mother. Her PhD thesis to be submitted in 2012 is 'an exploration of midwifery practice during birth'. Rachel has written articles for journals, magazines and websites, and presented at many conferences and study days. She is also the author of MidwifeThinking blog site.

Lynne Staff

Lynne has been a midwife since 1983. Lynne has practiced in public, private and community care. In 1997, she helped to establish the Nambour Selangor Maternity Unit, where she continued to work until her move to Tasmania in 2008. She has worked as a midwifery educator in hospital and tertiary programs. As a manager, professional development and 'hands-on' midwife, Lynne has developed policies, procedure, practice guidelines and education programs for midwives and learning packages for warm water immersion and water birth, vaginal birth after Caesarean, breech birth and epidural analgesia/anaesthesia. She has a strong interest in consumer information and she has undertaken research and completed an Honours Thesis focused on the choice for a Caesarean section in a first pregnancy in the absence of a medical indication. Passionate about the sociological influences on pregnancy, birth and breastfeeding, she is about to commence a PhD. She currently works at the Mersey Community Hospital in LaTrobe, Tasmania.

Patrice Hickey

Patrice presently holds a position as a Clinical Midwife Consultant, Sunshine Hospital - Western Health, Melbourne, Victoria where her work has been focused on implementing an all risk caseload model of midwifery inclusive of the Victorian Department of Health pilot Home Birth program.

The other major committees that consume her spare time are as a Board member of the Perinatal Services Advisory Committee; as a member of the Consultative Council on Obstetric and Paediatric Mortality and Morbidity – Stillbirth Sub-Committee and as a member of the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Accreditation Council – Registered Midwife Accreditation Committee.

Dr Michael Koutsoukis

Michael is the Senior Staff Specialist in Obstetrics and Gynaecology at South West Healthcare in Warrnambool. He has made a career working in rural and regional centres, and is a firm advocate of reducing the current high rates of surgery in Obstetric services. He has worked in remote areas of Australia including Darwin, Alice Springs and Bowral and has taught at the University of Melbourne and The University of Wollongong.
